#### A Message from Katie Remedios, OLQP's DRE

When someone asks me what I do for a living, I get to say I have the best job in the world......teaching children about how much they are loved by God!

After many years of shaping a program of faith development for the parish, it is with a heavy heart that I announce my resignation as your Director of Religious Education. It has been an honor to serve the community, work with so many amazing children, and support hundreds of parents as the first and best teacher of the faith. I have completed everything that I was asked to do when first recruited by the Staff of OLQP; to build a system of faith formation that allows our children to not only know Jesus, but to love and serve him as disciples in action. After designing programs to prepare our children for the sacraments and expose our little ones to the foundations of our tradition, the time has come to move on. I plan to take a two-month sabbatical, beginning in July, hiking, traveling, and spending quality time with my family. In September, at the request of the pastor, I have agreed to return on a parttime basis, and focus my attention on rebuilding and strengthening the Family Circle program. This program has successfully served many, and is being studied and introduced all over the country as the true path to faith formation. My activities will include developing accessible Circle lessons, writing seven grade levels of curriculum for our Catholic Foundation classes, and planning Children's Liturgies. I will continue to advocate for adequate instruction space and inclusive opportunities to serve our children (and yes, sponsor the parish pie-baking event at Thanksgiv-

To sustain the faith of one child, studies show that it takes 15 people in the pews, to model, connect, interact, educate, welcome, and love the child. My parting wish as the Director of Religious Education is to ask the community to remember this, "It takes a village". And what an extraordinary village we have!

In today's readings, in the First Letter of Peter we are reminded that we are chosen and precious in the sight of God and in the Gospel Jesus tells us not to let our hearts be troubled, to have faith in him and in God, that he goes to prepare a place for us and will return to take us to him so that we might be where he is! These readings today offer us a wonderful opportunity to reflect on God's love for all of us, thus a diversity of dwelling places for us, a place for each one of us, no one is excluded by God, because indeed every child, woman and man is precious to God. Jesus tell the disciples that he is the way, the truth and the life, and we know God and see God through him. Pope Francis reminds us that "Jesus is the face of the Father's mercy". So in seeing Jesus' merciful words and actions the disciples were seeing God's mercy in action. Jesus tells his disciples that through their belief in him they will be able to do what he has done and even greater! Perhaps what is "even greater" is that Jesus talks about allowing the risen Christ, who dwells within us, to transform us into the presence of God's mercy in the midst of a wounded and suffering world. Perhaps the call of the Gospel is to allow ourselves to become "the face of the Father's mercy", to take on the mantel of mercy as Jesus' disciples. To be willing to make meaningful changes to our lives in order that we might better show forth God's mercy in our words and actions. As a nation, what role should "mercy" play in our response to our immigration and refugee crisis, criminal justice reform and to our other national debates currently raging? Is mercy even a value being discussed? How can I be more merciful in my words? What specifically can I do to be more merciful in my actions? 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# The Seeds of Mother's Day: A Proclamation for Peace

"Every mother is like Moses. She does not enter the promised land. She prepares a world she will not see."

Pope Paul VI

More than 130 years ago, noted American activist Julia Ward Howe first proposed the concept of Mother's Day. Howe was a prominent abolitionist who served as one of the catalysts promoting emancipation of slaves and later women's suffrage. A woman of deep religious conviction, Howe became increasingly convinced that war was an inappropriate means for furthering her social justice ideals and believed that these issues, which she cared deeply about, should instead be pursued nonviolently. With men throughout the Nation getting more and more engaged in a bloody Civil war, Howe proposed the Mother's Day annual "friendship" gathering as an appeal to fellow mothers from both the North and South, (who did not yet have voting rights) to unite and issue passionate demands for their husbands and sons to disarm and seek peace.

In her inaugural Mother's Day proclamation, she writes:

Arise, then, women of this day! Arise, all women who have hearts, whether our baptism be of water or of tears!

Say firmly: "We will not have great questions decided by irrelevant agencies. Our husbands will not come to us, reeking with carnage, for caresses and applause. Our sons shall not be taken from us to unlearn all that we have been able to teach them of charity, mercy and patience. We, the women of one country, will be too tender of those of another country to allow our sons to be trained to injure theirs."

Howe's vision was practiced internationally for the rest of her life with modest success and served as the spark for Anna Jarvis who later became the champion for getting the holiday national recognition in 1908. Jarvis became disillusioned at the commercialization of the commemoration and would spend much of her remaining life (through boycotts, lawsuits and protests) trying to restore the holiday back to the peace-promoting roots established by Howe.

While today's Mother's Day commemoration no longer fully captures Howe's mission, her efforts live on today with Catholics in the Pax Christi movement. Specifically, the organization grew out of a similar call by French and German Catholics who were searching for reconciliation following World War II.

On this important day, we express our appreciation to pioneers like Howe who promoted and championed the cause of peace. And just as importantly, we wish to thank and honor the mothers, grandmothers and caregivers for their tireless work to bring charity, mercy and patience...those seeds of peace....to our hearts, homes and world.
